

## Will you want to vote on university funding and fees in the coming Parliament? Do you have a university in your constituency?

The following note is a brief snapshot of the issues which are likely to be voted on or debated during the next Parliament and the ways University Alliance can provide useful information.

Universities are now major generators of economic growth for the UK and the largest employers in some cities. The main issues in the coming Parliament which will call for decisions and will raise public debate are:

## 1. Fees and Funding

- Following the current Review of Higher Education Funding (Lord Browne's Independent Review), decisions will need to be made regarding how to fund universities, especially whether there should be an increase in the contribution graduates make.
- Given the Liberal Democrats' objection to any increase in tuition fees, the University Alliance proposals for a Graduate Contribution Scheme might prove to be a useful basis on which to make progress on conversations about university funding.

# 2. Number of student places

- Last year about 160,000 students who applied to university couldn't get a place and the number is set to increase this year.
- A large proportion of the growth is coming from well gualified A-level students many of whom wish to study Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) related courses, which are key for economic growth.
- University Alliance can provide further information regarding increases in applications for STEM and STEM-related courses to our universities.<sup>2</sup>

### 3. Extent of cuts

- It has been confirmed that at least £1.49 billion of cuts will be made to universities in 2010/11 (£449m of those already allocated, £600m to be allocated), and it is likely that further cuts will be made.
- Universities contribute 2.3% of GDP (from 1.1% GDP investment) making them generators of economic growth and wealth creation. Cuts should be minimised, in order that universities can continue to drive economic recovery and the knowledge economy.
- University Alliance can provide further information regarding the role of our universities in helping businesses and graduates coming out of a recession, and also what Alliance universities are doing to drive economic recovery.<sup>3</sup>
